

# Unique New York

New York is a cultural melting pot of people of different races, ethnicities, religions, points of view and professions. With great street food, museums, art galleries and Broadway theatres, restaurants, shopping and parks, New York has something for everyone.

#### Manhattan

While Manhattanites tend to see their island as the centre of the universe, you have to admit that they have some good reasons. It is the most-visited, best-known and smallest of the five boroughs, being home to NYC landmarks like Times Square, Wall Street, Broadway, and Central Park. Although this is where you can see native celebs from Robert de Niro and Woody Allen to Lady Gaga... it retains a neighbourly feeling in many areas.

"The City" – as any self-respecting New Yorker calls it – is made up of five boroughs, which were designated in 1898: Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens, The Bronx, and Staten Island,

#### Queens

Queens, the largest of the boroughs, was supposedly named for Portuguese Queen Catherine of Braganza, who married King Charles II of Britain in 1662. Queens is a multi-ethnic borough with South and Central American, Greek, Central European, Indian and other communities.

Jackson Heights was the first "garden city" community built in the U.S., in the 1910s-20s. It is still a pleasant area with tree-lined streets of brownstone apartment buildings. Jazz was important to the area in the 1940s.

Musicians like Louis Armstrong and Ella Fitzgerald escaped Segregation in the racially mixed

communities of Queens, and more recent artists like LL Cool J, Nas and Run-D.M.C. all found their start in this borough.
